Director's Corner

Spring is a time of new beginnings. The Earth erupts with new life, the days promise greater warmth, and even Keeneland opens for its Spring Meet! Just as the world changes, so too do our students as they work their way toward graduation. That journey isn't always easy, but almost nothing good comes easily.

April is Mathematics Awareness Month and this is a good time to give a shout out to our math teachers who battle the students' fears that are often inherent with the prospect of studying math – sometimes a very long time after the last time they regularly encountered it. Students completely comfortable with math are few and far between; it is more usual to hear that they are worried about their ability to pass the test. But, we have a multi-faceted plan for that.

First, we have a magnificent team of math teachers who not only teach math, they also do last-minute review sessions immediately before the student takes the test --- an option that has proven extremely successful. Not only is the student receiving last second math reminders, test taking advice, and calculator tips, but they also get support, encouragement, and counseling that can make a difference in the student's self-efficacy. Going into a potentially life-changing test with confidence can produce positive results.

This is coupled with the College and Career Navigator's constant cheerleading. She's been heard telling students who were worrying about math that they only need to look to graduation for inspiration. Almost every student who walks across that graduation stage, she tells them, was once in their shoes – worrying about their ability to do the necessary math. But, they ALL did it successfully. If they put in the work and dedication, our staff will educate and support them past math.....and straight through to graduation.

So, this month, our hats are off to those who take the very real fears of students and turn them around, resulting in justified pride and educational accomplishment.



Over a long career teaching adults, I've watched well over a thousand students walk across graduation stages in their caps and gowns to receive their diplomas. From high school students to decades worth of college students, every last ceremony was heartwarming and emotional, but there's just something even more special about watching a GED graduation.

Adult Ed Works with Restaurants to **Help Employ Students**

Those working within Heartland Adult Education Consortium are expanding opportunities for those incarcerated looking to pursue work once they leave. The organization works with those currently incarcerated in detention centers in its five-county service area of Hardin, LaRue, Breckinridge, Grayson and Hart counties to help them earn their GED.

However, they also have other educational programs for inmates including integrated education training. This includes the ability to earn a ServSafe certificate, which is a three-week course. Restaurants are required to have at least one ServSafe certified employee on-site.

Chris Reed, director of Heartland Adult Education, said he has been working with his staff to expand these classes to all five counties. He said former director Diane Kelly began this program in Hardin County last vear.

On top of the ServSafe courses, the group also has included its own courses on customer service to make the education even more well-rounded. "We're trying to provide more opportunities for people to have this certificate and make them more employable in the food industry," he said.

However, Reed said they wanted to go the extra step and try to somehow ensure their ServSafe students have places to apply for a job and put their new training to the test.

In an effort to secure interviews for inmates who complete the program, dana wolfe, college and career navigator, has been reaching out to restaurants in the five-county service region and partnering with them. The partners in turn agree to provide ServSafe students an interview if they have the certificate in hand.

"We're not asking for any promises except for that you will open that door and you will give them an interview," she said. A total of around 30 restaurants in the service area have agreed to be a part of the initiative, wolfe said Friday. This list will be given to those who graduate the ServSafe program.

Donnie Simoneit, co-owner of Pappaw's BBQ and More, immediately became a partner when wolfe called him about the project. He said as a formerly incarcerated person, he understands what it's like to try and find a job after leaving and rejoining the community.

Not all students who work on ServSafe certificates are passionate about food service; however, considering local restaurants appear to be always hiring, it allows these students to find a job easily and help these businesses fill their staff, wolfe said.

"It might not be the permanent solution, but it's a temporary solution that gets you back on your feet to get you back into society and be a contributing member to the community," Simoneit said.

When talking with those inmates who are working on ServSafe classes, wolfe said they appear to be hopeful and glad that there are places they can go that won't immediately turn them away.

"They need to know that the community doesn't hate them," Simoneit said.
