#### **Director's Corner**


It doesn't seem like a year since I came on Board here at Heartland Adult Ed. And, yet, here we are at the end of our fiscal year – a year that flew by!



## LARUE

"Hodgenville was established in 1818 and became the county seat when Larue County was created in 1843. Robert Hodgen served as sheriff and as representative of Hardin County in the General Assembly of Kentucky.

In addition to operating his mill and farm, Hodgen operated in his home an inn or 'ordinary' in which many notables were entertained. Among Hodgen's customers were Thomas and Nancy Lincoln, whose "'inking Spring Farm' is located three miles south of Hodgenville. It was there, on February 12, 1809, that their son, Abraham, was born.

The future President is said to have come to the mill many times to play with the Hodgen children. The Lincoln family lived on the Sinking Spring farm until 1811 when they moved 10 miles north to the Knob Creek Farm." (www.achp.gov/preserve-america/community/hodgenville-kentucky)




## BRECKINRIDGE

"Breckinridge County, the thirty-ninth in the State, is one of those bordering on the Ohio River. It was formed in 1799 from a part of Hardin County, and named for Hon. John Breckinridge, the first of that illustrious family in Kentucky. It is bounded on the north by the State of Indiana, from which it is separated by the Ohio River; on the east by Meade and Hardin Counties; on the south by Grayson County; on the west by Hancock and Ohio Counties.

The county... has its caves and other natural wonders. Along Sinking Creek particularly are a number of caves, some of them considerable in extent. Two or three miles above Clifton Mills, on the creek, is the 'Penitentiary Cave,' one of the most extensive in the county. It has never been fully explored, but so far as it has been...[it is] rich in subterranean magnificence. Near Webster is another cave worthy of a description. Two or three hundred yards from the entrance, a subterranean stream is reached that is almost equal in the sounds produced, to Echo River in the Mammoth Cave." The county was named for John C. Breckinridge. Battle-fields.org writes, "Born in Lexington, Kentucky in 1821, John Cabell Breckinridge was a graduate of Centre College and later Transylvania Law School in 1845. He holds the record as the youngest Vice President ever elected to office, serving under President James Buchanan starting in 1856. In 1859, a year before his term as Vice President was to expire, he was elected to the U.S. Senate.." (www.battlefields.org/learn/biographies/john-c-breckinridge).

# GRAYSON.

"Grayson County is located in west-central Kentucky and is bordered by the Rough River on the north and the Nolin River on the southeast. Formed in 1810, it was the fifty-fourth county established from land given by Hardin and Ohio counties. The county is named for William Grayson, a United States Senator from Virginia and a Revolutionary War colonel. Leitchfield, named for Major David Leitch the original owner of the town site, is the county seat. The town was formally incorporated in 1866."





The current courthouse located in Leitchfield, Kentucky, is the fourth courthouse for Grayson County. The first three were lost to fires that destroyed some or all of the records. The first fire was the 1864 fire, the second was in 1896, and the third burned in 1936. The fourth courthouse was built in 1938. (https://explorekyhistory.ky.gov/items/show/643? tour=45&index=1)

Historical Marker near the Courthouse: "For Col. William Grayson, 1740-90, aide de-camp to Gen. Washington. Law-yer; in Revolutionary Army, 1776-79; Board of War, 1780-81; Virginia Assembly and Continental Congress, 1784-87; State Convention ratifying Federal Constitution 1788; first U. S. Senate, 1789-90. Washington once owned 5,000 acres in county, which was formed from Hardin and Ohio counties." (https://www.hmdb.org/m.asp?m=123269)







Hart County was founded in 1819, created from land from Hardin and Barren Counties. The county was named for Kentucky native Captain Nathaniel Gray Smith Hart, who died in the War of 1812. At the time the county was formed, Munfordville was the largest town in the new county and was designated as the county seat for this reason. Currently, the largest city in Hart County is Horse Cave.

Hart County has had three courthouses. The first was built in 1820 and then torn down seventy-five years after construction. The second courthouse burned on January 3, 1928. The current courthouse was constructed on approximately the same location as the second courthouse.

In terms of ancient history, Salts Cave lies beneath portions of Hart County. It is one of the richest repositories of Native American artifacts in this part of North America. Many of the artifacts found in Salts Cave are now housed in the Heyl Museum in New York City. Most of Salts Cave lies within Mammoth Cave National Park.

Hart County has a significant link to Daniel Boone. Daniel Boone's family camped above Boiling Springs in 1775. During their encampment a young son died. He is reported to be buried above the spring in an unmarked grave.

In the nineteenth century, Hart County was host to several noted visitors who came to stay at the Old Munford Inn. Local legend says that Andrew Jackson stayed overnight in the inn. Jenny Lind is said to have visited in the 1850's.

Hart County was home to two Civil War generals. Thomas J. Wood and Simon Bolivar Buckner, who later became governor of Kentucky, both went to Green River Academy and then to West Point. The two fought on opposite sides in the war, which was the case with many family members and friends in Kentucky during the war."

Here's the part of the newsletter that I will definitely hear about later. If you know Chris, you will fully understand why......







